Health refers to a person's mental, physical, and social wellbeing. A person's state of health will vary throughout their life, and can be impacted by illness or disability. A disability is "any condition of the body or mind that makes it more difficult for the person with the condition to do certain activities and interact with the world around them" (CDC). About 15% of the global population live with some form of disability and this number is increasing (WHO). Some people disagree on the correct usage of the term 'disability'.

Accessibility means that people are not excluded from using something (e.g. a service, a physical space, a website etc.) on the basis of their state of health, illness, or disability. It is important that the world becomes more accessible, so that all people are given equitable treatment and can thrive.

Wild Rose was born without the lower part of her arm. She was rejected by her mother but has grown into an independent young woman. Aurelia is locked in a tower but she has wings and a plan. Saffy is a dutiful daughter who longs for adventure. When fate brings these three together, the secrets that have kept people in their place will be exposed. And there will be consequences.




What the World Doesn't See, by Mel Darbon






El Deafo, by Cece Bell


