




Concentr8 by William Sutcliffe




The Boy with the Butterfly Mind by Victoria Williamson



Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder or **ADHD** is a condition where you have lots of energy and have difficulty concentrating. Symptoms of ADHD include:

- feeling restless or fidgety
- talking a lot and interrupting others
- becoming easily distracted
- finding it hard to concentrate
- saying or doing things without thinking.

Autism is a developmental condition that affects how you see the world and how you interact with other people. Autism is a spectrum condition, which means it affects people in very different ways. However, there are certain traits which can include:

- difficulty recognising or understanding other people's emotions and expressing their own
- being over- or under-sensitive to things like loud noises and bright lights, and finding crowded noisy spaces challenging
- preferring familiar routines and finding unexpected changes to routine challenging or distressing
- having intense and specific interests in things
- difficulties reading body language, understanding sarcasm and facial expressions.

Definition from Young Minds



Dyslexia is a learning difficulty which affects your ability to read, write and spell. It can also cause problems with numbers, directions and short-term memory. Dyslexic people can be successful in any area of life and often show a lot of creative or intellectual ability. Symptoms can include:

- reading very slowly
- difficulty with spelling
- mixing up sounds in long words
- confusing numbers, dates and times
- needing to have instructions repeated
- problems with note taking
- finding it difficult to plan work.

Definition from The Mix

Tourette Syndrome or **TS** is when somebody makes movements and noises that they can't control. These noises and movements are called tics. Tics are usually fast and happen again and again and they are involuntary movements. Tics can include:

- blinking
- head or neck twitching
- sniffing or throat clearing
- complex ticcing, like spinning on the spot or shouting out unusual things.
