Refugee Experience

A refugee is someone who has been forced to flee their country because of persecution, war, or violence. A refugee might be vulnerable to persecution for reasons of race, religion, nationality, political opinion, gender, sexuality, or membership of a particular social group. Most likely, refugees are unable to return home, or live in fear of doing do.

Officially, people fleeing their country start out as asylum seekers and are then granted refugee status when a new country decides that they are allowed to stay there. Official refugees have more rights than asylum seekers. However, the terms are often used interchangably.



The Un-forgotten Coat, by Frank Cottrell Boyce



You don't want to get on the wrong side of the people who run Little Town. When he meets Pavel, a refugee from Old Country, the rules start to get broken. Then the bombs come, and Little Town changes forever. Hamish wants to keep everyone happy, even if it kills him. But he's got to kill someone else first.






Wall, by Tom Clohosy Cole






Teacup, by Rebecca Young
